Journal of the College of Electors of President and Vice President of the United States, held 6th Decem^r 1876.

Richmond Virginia
December 6th 1876.

The College of Electors of President and Vice-President of the United States of America for the next ensuing regular term of the respective offices thereof being Electors duly and legally appointed by and for the State of Virginia on this, the first Wednesday, the sixth day of December, in the year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred and seventy six, met and convened at the Capitol in the city of Richmond at 12 o'clock at noon, and having severally taken and subscribed the oath of Office prescribed by the Constitution of Virginia;

On the motion of A M Keiley the college was organized by the election of B Johnson Barbour as President of the College, and by the appointment of S Bassett French as Secretary.

Ordered, that the roll of Electors ~~be~~ called, when the following Electors answered to their names, Ins: W. Daniel, Benjamin F. Bland, Thomas Tabb, Anthony M. Keiley, Erasmus K. Harris, Ins E Penn, Wm M. Cabell, H H Riddleberger, B Johnson Barbour, and David S. Purcell.

It appearing that F. W. M. Holliday a duly and legally appointed Elector has failed and neglected to appear, the Electors present by virtue of the powers vested in them by the Tenth section of Chapter five of the Code of Virginia (Edition 1873) proceeded immediately to fill, by ballot, the said vacancy

by the appointment of Henry C. Allen in the place of the said F. W. M. Holliday by a "plurality of Votes"; and the said Henry C. Allen appearing took the oaths of office as prescribed by the Constitution of Virginia and the College of Electors was thereby completed; all of which was then and there duly certified under the hands of the ten Electors present.

The College then proceeded to vote, by ballot, for President of the United States of America for the next ensuing regular term of the said office, H. H. Riddleberger, one of the Electors having been appointed the teller to collect and count the ballots; which being so collected in the presence of the College was counted and it appeared that Samuel J. Tilden of the State of New York received eleven votes, being the votes of all the electors, and that no other person received a vote -

The College then proceeded to vote, by ballot, for Vice-President of the United States of America for the next ensuing regular term of said office, and the ballots being collected by H. H. Riddleberger, one of the Electors, and counted in the presence of the College it appeared that Thomas A. Hendricks of the State of Indiana received eleven votes, and that no vote was cast for any other person.

And the College of Electors then certified the said votes for President and Vice-President in accordance with the requirements of the Constitution and Laws of the United States, and the provisions of the Laws of Virginia in such case made and provided, in triplicate, each certificate being signed by all of the Electors; which certificates were then and there in the presence of the College sealed by Wm. M. Cabell, one of the Electors and endorsed by the said Electors, two of which were directed to the President of the Senate of the

United States at the seat of Government, and the other to the Judge of the District Court of the United States for the Eastern District of Virginia at Richmond: And the said College of Electors in writing signed by all of the Electors appointed E. S. Gregory of the City of Pittsburgh the messenger to bear one of the aforesaid certificates to the President of the Senate of the United States at the seat of Government before the first Wednesday in January next ensuing; and the President of the College of Electors was directed to send one other of the said certificates by mail, registered, to the said President of the Senate of the United States at the seat of Government, and the remaining one to deliver to the Judge of the District Court of the United States for the Eastern District of Virginia at Richmond.

Ordered that S. Bassett French be allowed the sum of Fifty dollars for his services as Secretary to the Board,

And then the College of Electors adjourned
sine die.



certify that by the ballots of the undersigned, Electors as aforesaid,
here and being present, being a plurality of votes, Henry C. Allen
was appointed Elector of President and Vice-President of the United
States of America for the next ensuing regular terms of the respec-
tive offices thereof in the place of the said F. W. M. Holliday ne-
glecting as aforesaid to attend.
